

## Each of Us a Desert by Mark Oshiro

The first book in The New York Public Library's Teen Banned Book Club is Mark Oshiro's *Each of Us a Desert*, a fantasy novel about two girls on a magical journey across the desert. Look out for more featured Banned Book Club titles through June 2024!

#### **Discussion Questions**

- 1. What does the book's title mean to you?
- 2. As a "cuentista," Xochitl has the magical ability to draw the villagers' stories out of them and take them into herself, cleansing the villagers of their pain and guilt. How would you feel if you had this ability? What might be the benefits and the downsides?
- 3. Getting to tell your own story is an important part of the book. What story would you like to share with the world about yourself?
- **4.** Wherever possible, the Spanish in the book is written without gender. Why do you think the author chose to write this way?
- 5. Xochitl must weigh her needs with those of her community. What do you think about the decision she ends up making? Have you ever had to balance your needs with those of others? If so, what did you do?

### **Activities & Digital Resources**

- 1. Solís is Xochitl's god and the book is told as a prayer to them. Write a story retelling part of the book from Solís's perspective.
- 2. In some ways, the story of *Each of Us a Desert* ends where it began. Write a short story where the ending is also the start.
- 3. Draw your own pictures or use images you find to create a mood board or collage to visualize elements of the book. What does the landscape look like? How would you depict a pesadilla?
- 4. Explore the different landscapes—including deserts—and forces of nature that feature in the book. Start by visiting the National Park Service website, navigate to "Explore America's Story," and search by topic: **nps.gov**
