



from the executive director

Help us celebrate and support Westerly Library & Wilcox Park and all libraries across the country!

In just a few short weeks we will be celebrating National Library Week. This year National Library Week runs from April 6 to 12. During this week we observe the Right to Read Day on April 7, National Library Workers Day on April 8, National Library Outreach Day on April 9, and Take Action for Libraries Day on April 10. April is also School Library Month, a time to celebrate the essential role that strong school libraries play in transforming learning.

The right or freedom to read is essential in a democratic society. And this freedom has been under attack for years but the censorship isn't just on books. Library workers, educators, and community members are being targeted and made fearful to buy books, to check out books, to teach a diversity of viewpoints, and to even report

This is why there is a Bill in both the RI House and Senate to protect library workers and educators and your right to read whatever you choose. The Rhode Island Freedom to Read Act (S0238, H5726) protects Rhode Islanders' fundamental American rights to free speech, free inquiry and the right to form and express our own opinions, as laid out by the First Amendment and the Rhode Island Constitution.

Libraries are also facing attacks at the national level. Recently, there was an Executive Order issued in March intended to defund seven agencies to the greatest extent of the law including Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS). State officials, librarians, and library supporters are already working to fight this. Cuts to funding could impact:

- Summer reading programs for children, teens and adults
- Statewide reading programs such as Kids Reading Across Rhode Island and RI Children's Book Award
- majority of digitization of *The Westerly Sun*), services for veterans and differently abled individuals, social services, and learning programs
- Resource sharing including AskRI and interlibrary loan

The loss of federal support for library services could devastate libraries. Please show your support of libraries. The biggest thing you could do to show your support is to use your library. Using the library shows that people want and need their libraries. You can also let your elected officials know about your support of libraries and all they do for you and your community.

And don't forget to join us during National Library Week! We have great things planned that you won't want to miss!

If you happen upon the August 15, 1894 edition of The Westerly Sun, you can read all about the opening of the "Memorial building", also known as Westerly Library! Built as a Civil War memorial, the paper states the building will "stand as a constant reminder of the sacrifice made by Westerly men for their country." You can see the original floor plan, read about the borrowing rules, learn about Stephen Wilcox, and much more. In fact, there was a gymnasium and bowling alley that was open every day except Sundays!




The Serviceberry Book Club with the Westerly Land Trust • Wednesday, April 23rd • 10 am-1 pm • Wahaneeta Preserve

We are delighted to once again be teaming with the Westerly Land Trust for a book discussion as part of Earth Day celebrations. On Wednesday, April 23rd at 10am we will meet at the Wahaneeta Preserve cabin followed by a hike through the woods of Wahaneeta Preserve. We will be discussing The Serviceberry: *Abundance and Reciprocity in the Natural World* by Robin Wall Kimmerer.

This book examines the connections between indigenous knowledge, ecology, and the natural world. The author explores lessons we can learn from plants and ecosystems, focusing on themes of reciprocity, healing, and the relationship between humans and nature. There is a focus on the idea of a gift economy, using the serviceberry as an example for how nature thrives through sharing. She invites readers to reimagine our relationship with the earth, embracing a worldview rooted in gratitude, abundance, and the principles of a 'gift economy'. Please note that registration is required, and spots are limited. You can register by clicking on the Serviceberry Book Club. If you've ever envied runners, or wanted to run a 5k, this group is for you!

Our running group is designed to help almost anyone go from a "non-runner" to a "5k distance runner" in 8 weeks, following the C25k® program. Each run, we'll alternate between running and walking for short periods of time, slowly increasing the running time over the weeks until you're able to run 3.1 miles straight! To get the most out of this program, participants should plan on completing 2 additional run/walks on their own during the week, each of which will take 30 minutes.




About the presenter:

Kathryn Aaron, soprano, is an established interpreter of early vocal repertory. Her unique blend of musicality and scholarship encompasses a repertoire that spans from the liturgical drama of Hildegard von Bingen to the operatic fire of Handel and beyond. In regular demand as an oratorio singer, she has shared the stage as a soloist with Masaki Suzuki, Nic McGegan, Paul Hillier, and Simon Carrington. In 2020, she was appointed assistant conductor at the Chorus of Westerly where she leads the Foundations Chorus and is the song leader for the Westerly Threshold Singers. She holds degrees in vocal performance from Peabody Conservatory at Johns Hopkins University, the Jacob School of Music at Indiana University, and the Institute of Sacred Music at Yale University.

America & the Holocaust: Jim Crow Laws, Eugenics, and the March Toward Genocide in Nazi-Occupied Europe • Wednesday, April 30th • 6:00-7:30 pm • Auditorium

Join Barbara Wahlberg for this 75 minute presentation provides a case study examining Nazi Germany and the United States during the 1930s, at a time when racism and eugenics were enshrined in law and practice. We will examine the national and historical contexts in which racism manifested in the two countries, and explore how the pseudoscience of eugenics as well as concerns about "racial purity" found its way into the laws of the United States and Nazi Germany. Barbara Wahlberg has been a Holocaust and Genocide educator for over 30 years, a retired ELA teacher in Cranston Public Schools, a longtime board member of the Sandra Bornstein Holocaust Education Center, a 2002 USHMM Teaching Fellow and received the 2018 Genocide Educator of the Year Award for Rhode Island. She has served on the Rhode Island Commission on Holocaust and Genocide Education since its

This 43' x 43' space includes restrooms, kitchen facilities, and access to a terrace overlooking Wilcox Park, weather permitting.


