

Have you ever wondered how books, DVDs, or items from the Library of Things are added into the library collection? Once items are ordered and arrive from our vendors, our Collection Management (CM) department receives them. Here, invoices are checked and coded to the appropriate fund, and items are processed so that they are available on the shelves for you, our patrons.

Collection Management is one of the busiest departments as deliveries are made every day—not just for library materials like books, but for items related to programs

in every department. In addition, damaged items are also sent to CM to evaluate whether it is possible to repair them. Although their work is often behind the scenes, the library's operations would not be possible without our team in CM!

Some of the more unusual items that have to be cataloged are from our Library of Things including a knife sharpener and disco ball. Working to build our collection is never ending!

It is now ready for its next chapter as The Pop-Up at Coy.

The space was named after Sallie Coy, honoring her contributions to the organization and her many years of dedicated service.





So you're walking through Wilcox Park and notice your phone is running low and will not last through the podcast/playlist that accompanies your journey. Or you're deep into a term paper, and your tablet decides to go dark along with all of the research you've completed. Maybe you're in the reading room basking in the afternoon glow and your Air pods just turn off. Now, the question is, where can you charge your device? Thanks to a RI Legislative Grant through our local Senator Victoria Gu, we have has acquired an Honest Waves Secure Tech 8 Plus Charging Locker – the perfect solution! remember for later), and plug in your

You will find our new charging locker across from the Circulation Desk. The Charging Locker consists of eight lock-

ers that have three charging cables: a Micro USB, Lightning and Type C that will fit most devices. Bonus feature: the charging locker will also sanitize your device using an Ultraviolet-C light! The lockers are sized for your smartphone or

You don't need a library card to use the charging locker – it's available to everyone! To get started, press the green Sterilization & Charge button below the keypad. Follow the prompts on the charging locker to choose a bay, enter a 4 digit pin you create (and you must device. When you're ready to reclaim you're now charged and sanitized device, push the Retrieve button and follow the prompts. Happy Charging!

We are excited to announce that we have been awarded Arbnet Arboretum Accreditation Program!

The ArbNet accreditation is important to our arboretum at Westerly Library and Wilcox Park because it solidifies the essence of what our historic Park represents. Since the inception of Wilcox Park in 1898, we have had many knowledgeable and skilled Park Superintendents and Park Staff that contributed to the development of our arboretum. Currently, 2 full-time and 3 part-time staff dedicate their time to the park. The stewardship of our tree collection has been a high priority for the Memorial and Library Association which brings great pleasure to local and seasonal visitors. The value of our arboretum is evident by our patrons' deep appreciation of the visual beauty of our trees, as well as arborists' and other horticultural specialists' deeper understanding of our individual specimens and collections as a whole. The Wilcox Park arboretum enhances our nationally significant listing on the National Register of Historic Places and is a worthy example of Landscape Architect Warren Manning's (associate of Frederick Law Olmsted) work who designed the Park from 1898-1904.

Enhancements to Warren Manning's design include the addition of formal and perennial gardens, a native pollinator garden and rain garden. These gardens are seamlessly integrated within the arboretum. With over 60 dedicated volunteers per season, mostly seasoned University of Rhode Island Master Gardeners, our vast array of plants and trees are meticulously maintained throughout the growing season.

The Wilcox Park arboretum is home to 8 RI Champion trees as designated by the RI Tree Council. These trees, along with approximately one-third of the trees in the arboretum are individually labeled by genus, species, and common name. In fact, the trees and select woody shrubs in the park have been inventoried in a comprehensive database in Google Maps which is accessible to the public by QR code or link.

The Wilcox Park arboretum has been home to a number of public educational programs for years. This year we will host the 41st annual Garden Market Fair that boasts a variety of local vendors and community organizations, complete with alpacas and a host of children and adult activities. For years, the URI Master Gardeners have led monthly Specimen Tree and Native Plant tours on the second and fourth Saturdays from May through October. Private tree tours are also conducted ~10 times per year. Patrons are very appreciative and often return more than once over the growing season as the trees transition from leafing out, to bloom, to producing fruit, to preparing for winter. If scheduling is prohibitive, patrons can pick up a hard copy of the self-guided tour of Wilcox Park at the our Public Services desk in the library for a small fee, and tour our specimen trees, monuments, and gardens at their leisure.

From our newly planted grove of dawn redwoods (Metasequoia glyptostroboides) to our well established Cherry Alee, along with our recognized 8 RI Champion trees, our historic 15-acre arboretum hosts a wide variety of trees and woody shrubs comprised of 159 different tree species and 43 unique cultivars. Securing Level II accreditation is an honor, confirming Wilcox Park as a bona fide premier arboretum.
