

AskRI.org has various databases that you can access from the comfort of your home. Flipster is an online newsstand that allows you to browse through magazine titles or search for a specific title. Some of the available titles include "bon appetit"," National Geographic" and "The New Yorker". Additionally, there are several Spanish publications available including "Hola", "Newsweek en Espanol", and "People en Espanol".

Another fantastic program available is Mango Languages which is an online language-learning program that can help you learn more than 70 languages. Learning Express has resources including career preparation and access to tons of exam preparation materials including the SAT, nursing exams, and so much more. Udemy has more than 4,000 continuously updated, on-demand video courses to enhance career skills or to pursue a personal interest. "Freedom to Read" Panel Discussion Monday, March 3rd, 6:00-7:30 PM, Auditorium





About Paul Helgesen:

I have been involved in the arts my entire life starting with Mom and Dad who raised me, both graduates of Rhode Island School of Design, both practicing artists. My professional resume includes many years as Design Director for the Pfaltzgraff Dinnerware Company. During that period we collaborated with the Museum of American Folk Art in New York City when we designed and developed the "America" dinnerware collection. I have always admired folk art and became a collector of antiques including furniture, toy cars and Jugtown ware as well as folk art including crows, duck decoys and bird houses.

My fascination with all things nautical began over forty years ago on a tiny remote island off the coast of Nova Scotia. After our first visit, we fell in love with the place, began spending summers there and, ultimately, bought a summer home and a fishing boat. Life on the island is like going back in time. The year-round residents are lobstermen who live in a tiny community with their boats, dirt roads, a two room schoolhouse, an old fire truck and a little ferry that goes to and from the mainland. This way of life is my inspiration for "Life in the Maritimes".

For materials I use primarily rough sawn lumber from the sawmill. I also use copper and brass as well as pieces of rusted steel that I pick up on the roads and beaches. My work is a mixture of whimsy and realism-some of it serious and some of it ridiculous.

Solomon lived in London for two years and spent the summer of 2014 in the English countryside working alongside Condon, and acclaimed actors Ian McKellen and Laura Linney, on the picturesque, mysterious and moving story of an aging Sherlock Holmes. In the film, McKellen plays a retired Sherlock who struggles with dementia, but develops an unexpected friendship with a young boy who encourages him to dig into his deepest memories to solve one of his final cases. Solomon will be present at the screening and offer a Q&A after to answer questions about the process and his experience working on the film.

Though winter weather continues, believe it or not spring is just around the corner! In anticipation of warmer weather and sunny days in Wilcox Park, our staff have been busy planning community-wide events to look forward to in the coming months.

Mark your calendars for our annual resource fair, Community Connections: Every Neighbor Counts on Saturday, May 3rd from 12-2pm in Wilcox Park! In addition to entertainment for all ages, local organizations will offer services and information focused on enriching our lives and wellbeing. From eye exams and haircuts to legal services and food assistance, Community Connections has brought a wide variety of resources to our community. You won't want to miss this great community event!

This winter has been difficult for many of our neighbors and though the Community Connections event is just one day, we know our community is eager to support neighbors year round. Beginning March 31st, Westerly Library & Wilcox Park will be hosting a spring food drive for the Jonnycake Center of Westerly which serves 160,000 meals annually including 3,310 weekend meals to children in our community. The Jonnycake Center would benefit most from donations of breakfast, lunch, and snack items for kids, as well as "extras" like coffee, tea and condiments for adults. Often these simple pleasures like a favorite warm beverage or salad dressing are the first to be cut when budgets are tight. 


With technology constantly evolving, there are always new things to learn! Want to learn how to utilize your devices? We encourage you to join us!




